

## **Regular Pickens County Council Meeting**

January 14, 2019

6:30 PM

County Council met in regular session, in the Auditorium of the County Administration Facility, with Chairman Roy Costner presiding. Agendas, bearing date, time, and location of meeting were mailed to members of council and local news media on January 9, 2019.

### **WELCOME AND CALL TO ORDER:**

Chairman Roy Costner called the meeting of January 14, 2019 to order and welcomed those in attendance. Chairman Roy Costner led the Invocation and Pledge of Allegiance.

### **PUBLIC FORUM:**

Chairman Roy Costner opened the Public Forum and requested the Clerk to call upon the citizens signed up to speak.

1. Franklin Reynolds: Mr. Reynolds stated a month ago, he attended the Central Rural Fire Board District Meeting and stated he learned some things that have been bothering him. Mr. Reynolds stated during public forum, he was not able to use the entire three minutes. He stated this is the second time the Fire Chief has denied his rights as a citizen. He stated he feels they are not getting what they are paying for with the City of Central contract. He stated the City of Central added two paid positions during the day and he learned the fire district is paying for one of those positions. Mr. Reynolds stated he lives right near the Central Rural Fire District Station and it always seems like no one is there throughout the day. He stated if the Rural Fire District is paying for this position, why they are sitting in the City of Central all day every day. He asked staff if they could look into this contract.
2. Alex Siatta: Mr. Siatta stated he left the last council meeting after public forum because he had to be in Easley at 7:00pm to run his business. He stated he did not run off because he didn't want to hear what council had to say. Mr. Siatta stated the scoreboard is clear; the old jail had a chapel and the new jail will not have chapel. He stated council made this decision. Mr. Siatta stated in March of 2016, Superintendent Danny Merck recommended Chairman Judy Edwards close Holly Springs and AR Lewis. He stated he was in the corner voting no. He stated during this time, he was on the losing side of votes. Mr. Siatta stated he was Chairman in 2011-2012 and there were no schools that were closed. After much more discussion, Mr. Siatta stated concerning the mistakes in the Dacusville school board election, the majority response from council is they have no authority to do anything about this election. He stated that council has no authority in running the election, but they do have authority over financials in the election office. He stated they pay

for everything in the elections department, from the salaries to the elections themselves. He stated it also says in the law that council has audit and fiscal oversight responsibility over the department. He stated they should invite the election director to a hearing and ask them to explain what went wrong, why it went wrong, who responsibility is and what actions are being taken to make sure this never happens again. He stated if the elections director does not show up to the hearing, just order the County Administrator to audit and investigate what happened. Mr. Siatta stated council said they were leaders, and they should lead.

#### **ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT:**

The County Administrator, Gerald Wilson, provided the following report:

Mr. Wilson stated he would like to add an Economic Development Update for Project Providence to Executive Session this evening.

Mr. Wilson stated he would like to remind Council and staff that County Offices will be closed on Monday, January 21, 2019 to observe the Martin Luther King Jr. Holiday.

Mr. Wilson asked Jay Pitts, Tourism Director, to please step to the podium to brief council on the remainder events for the 150<sup>th</sup> Celebration.

- Jay Pitts stated he wanted to remind everyone that Mark Wood will be in Pickens County in April 8-13. He stated Mark Wood will be bringing his entire education team to teach music. Mr. Pitts stated they began the campaign back in April 2018, and followed up in August by recruiting all teachers to help students. He stated right now in Pickens County, we are at 700+ students from all schools who have signed up. He stated they are expecting numbers to increase. He stated there are around 165 students in Oconee County interested and he is waiting on the go-ahead for Oconee County to be involved. Mr. Pitts stated they have a contract with Little John Coliseum and he has asked council to review. He stated they plan to kick off the marketing campaign with Mark Wood towards the end of this week. He stated he is aware this event will take place on April 13 at 7:30pm, the same date as the Clemson spring game and he feels it will be to our advantage.

#### **COUNCIL CORRESPONDENCE:**

Chairman Roy Costner asked if for any council correspondence.

- Vice Chairman Chris Bowers stated he and Councilman Hudson attended the Pickens County State Legislative Delegation Annual Meeting on Monday, January 7<sup>th</sup>. He stated the common theme in the room was unfunded mandates and fully funding local government fund. He stated he believes it was heard and as council, they spoke and pushed the topic as well.
- Councilman Carl Hudson stated the plan for is to make the current funding level the new 100% funded. He stated we are being funded at a reduced level but he feels they are going to change the law to make the level that they are funding us now 100%. He stated this is bad because we are not going to get the money we are supposed to get.

- After more discussion, Councilman Wes Hendricks asked if they talked about reducing any responsibilities.
- Councilman Carl Hudson stated the truth is to fund us; they will have to raise taxes. They do not want to have to raise taxes, but they want taxes raised on County level. He stated it is playing with numbers and changing the law to make that happen.

Chairman Roy Costner called for other council correspondence. Seeing no other correspondence, Chairman Costner announced moving to Motion Period and New Business.

Chairman Roy Costner opened the floor for motion period.

Hearing no other items for new business, Chairman Roy Costner closed the floor.

#### **CONSIDERATION OF THE RENEWAL OF THE FIRE SERVICES CONTRACT BETWEEN THE CENTRAL RURAL FIRE DISTRICT AND THE TOWN OF CENTRAL.**

Administrator Gerald Wilson stated this is a recommendation from the Central Rural Fire District and the Town of Central to renew the existing contract for another 5 years. Mr. Wilson stated this contract is the same as it was prior to this contract, the only difference is an updated ordinance number, it is changed from 10 years to 5 years and it allows us to get out within a year at any point during the agreement.

- Vice Chairman Chris Bowers confirmed with Administrator Wilson that there is a 180 days' notice.
- Councilman Trey Whitehurst stated he had a question about the man we are paying to be there. He asked if it is supposed to be a manned station.
- Administrator Wilson stated he is going to verify if we are paying for someone to be there. He stated he will find out how that employee is being paid and before we execute the contract, we can bring this to the next council meeting to confirm if all of council would like to do that.

- After much more discussion, Chairman Roy Costner made a motion to table this agenda item to the next council meeting. Motion was seconded by Vice Chairman Chris Bowers and carried unanimously.
- Administrator Wilson stated he will update council once he has information and he will also make sure the Chief is present at the next council meeting.

**REQUEST FROM DISTRICT 3 COUNCILMEMBER FOR COUNCIL TO CONSIDER THE VINEYARDS FIRE DISTRICT PROPOSAL TO PURCHASE A NEW FIRE TRUCK FROM FUND BALANCE.**

Administrator Gerald Wilson stated Rocky Odman, Vineyards Fire District Board member, will be speaking to council this evening about this request. He stated this request came through Councilman Wes Hendricks, and he asked staff to gather more information and options available.

Rocky Odman thanked council for the opportunity to present. He stated around a year and a half ago, as the county started to discuss possible consolidation of the fire districts within the county, they had a concern of how will they be able to maintain the high level of training within the Vineyards Fire Department, and put it up to speed in order to maintain the recently recognized the ISO 3 rating. He stated they made a presentation but with all the changes going on, it did not work. Mr. Odman stated with the help of Councilman Hendricks, Gerald, Ralph, Scott, and Phil, the plan was advised it would benefit three fire departments in the county at the same time if council approves. He stated in this proposal, the Vineyards would forego an estimated trade-in value of the engine if replaced. He stated it is valued at approximately \$100,000. He stated this engine is fully equip and would be donated to Holly Springs. He stated in return, Holly Springs would donate their engine to Rocky Bottom, who is in dire need of equipment, as he understands. Mr. Odman stated this plan has been reviewed by the Emergency Planning Committee and it fits with the possible of consolidation of districts. After much more discussion, he stated both Vineyards Fire Board and the POA are in agreement to this proposal.

- Councilman Wes Hendricks asked Mr. Odman to elaborate on Property's Owner's Associations. He asked in the past, when the fire board made purchasing decisions and the POA is on board, do you have that community's blessing to make the purchase.
- Mr. Odman stated yes, through the Property POA.
- Chairman Costner stated he does not know if the fire districts are consolidating, he stated they have put a task force in place and it does not mean it is going to happen. He stated no decision has been made and they are looking into all of those things. Chairman Costner asked Mr. Odman how many people live in the Vineyards Fire District.
- Mr. Odman stated roughly around 220 houses, and probably around 110 people who live their full-time.
- Chairman Costner asked of those people, how many know about this proposal.
- Mr. Odman stated of the full-timers, his guess is around 15% who are aware of it.
- Chairman Costner stated his concern is in order to be able to fund this; they will be extending the bond. He stated his concern is they voted on not to do this before because of extending the bond. He stated he was hoping they already had the money. He stated his concern also is only 15% of the full-time people know, which is only 15 people.
- Councilman Wes Hendricks stated in the past, isn't this the same percentage of people who knew about buying the other fire trucks.
- Mr. Odman stated yes, but that was when the community was just getting started and was much smaller. Last evening, Mr. Odman stated was at a gathering with his wife and around 10 other people. Mr. Odman stated he brought up bringing the proposal to the County and everyone at the gathering was in support.

- Vice Chairman Chris Bowers stated he is all about capital improvement plans, but he stated the biggest issue for him is while we have this other on the table and we are looking at this county wide, how are we going to make sure we can we improve all of our county equipment across the board. He stated if it wasn't a bond issue, he feels it will be totally different.
- Councilman Wes Hendricks stated that bond would pretty much be paid off if we do go into county consolidation. He stated who are we to tell them how to spend their money when they pay their own taxes and are willing to pay their taxes. Councilman Hendricks stated he met with the board a couple weeks ago about fire coverage and there were more than 15 people there. He stated there was probably around 40-50 residents there and everyone was in favor of high-class fire coverage. He stated they did not blink an eye at the tax dollar on that. He stated them paying their taxes for that fire truck to keep their equipment top-notch to protect the high dollar homes they have will save them money on their insurance.
- Councilman Whitehurst asked how much money it recommends they have in their reserve fund.
- Administrator Wilson stated our financial policy recommends between 10-15% on hand. He stated that is roughly \$90,000-\$100,000 at 10%.
- Councilman Whitehurst stated what the Vineyards Fire Board is basically saying they have a truck worth \$100,000. He stated they could go out and sell the truck, have \$100,000 (which is their 10% reserve) and go buy a new truck. He stated by what they just said, council would have no problem with that. Councilman Whitehurst stated the board is also saying they will be helping out the county by giving the truck to another fire district. He asked if the homeowners in the Vineyards are willing to pay the taxes for a fire truck for another district.
- After much more discussion and reviewing the supporting documents, Councilman Wes Hendricks asked Jim Keelor to step to the podium.
- Jim Keelor stated he is a liaison with the Vineyard's Home Owner Association and the Fire commission, and council. He stated he was president of the board for four years through the bankruptcy and served on the board for a total of six years. Mr. Keelor stated he spent a half hour this morning briefing the POA as to what this was. He stated they would like to make sure they can do the training and buy the equipment on the right schedule. He stated if they could do that, they would also like to help the county get better with their fire coverage. After much more discussion, Mr. Keelor stated they pay higher taxes because they volunteer to pay higher taxes to get the training, equipment and service they need.
- Councilman Whitehurst stated it seems to him that council would like to make sure everyone in this community is on board with this proposal. He stated if everyone is willing to do that, they are happy to accept this offer of the truck for this county. He asked if there was a way to poll everyone in the community to make sure everyone is on board.
  - After much more discussion, Councilman Whitehurst made a motion to move this agenda item to the Committee of the Whole and advised staff to work on a petition for the Vineyards Fire Board. Motion was seconded by Vice Chairman Bowers and carried unanimously.

Chairman Costner asked for a motion to constitute the First Reading In Title Only.

- Motion was made by Vice Chairman Bowers, seconded by Councilman Ensley Feemster and carried unanimously.

**SECOND READING OF AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ARTICLE 3 AND ARTICLE 4 OF THE PICKENS COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCE RELATED TO MULTI-FAMILY DWELLINGS (PER PLANNING COMMISSION RECOMMENDATIONS).**

Chairman Costner stated this has been giving to Council as a recommendation from the Planning Commission. Chairman Costner asked for a motion to constitute the second reading of Ordinance 562.

- Motion was made by Councilman Ensley Feemster and seconded by Vice Chairman Chris Bowers. Chairman Costner asked if there was any discussion.
- Vice Chairman Bowers stated he has several concerns after reviewing the documents. He stated he would like to make a motion to move this agenda item to Committee of the Whole to discuss further. Motion was seconded by Councilman Carl Hudson.
- Councilman Whitehurst asked Chris Brink if the Planning Commission has been working on this and has come up with what they discussed.
- Director of Community Development, Chris Brink, stated that is correct.
- Vice Chairman Bowers stated one of his concerns is where do the numbers come from. He stated if Chris is available to answer his questions he will pull his motion back.
- Councilman Whitehurst stated one of the things they were looking at was the project density.
- Vice Chairman Chris Bowers stated his concerns were where the original number came from, why the original number was what it was.
- Chris Brink stated regarding the original number, what they have in the books today is the original number. He stated that number is the maximum density they've always had in Pickens County. He stated they amended the multi-family housing section two years ago to increase the number from 4 to 8. Mr. Brink stated 8 is the max dense they allow any development within the county. He stated they looked further with this amendment to increase that number more, only in areas where there is service provided to support that dense development.
- After more discussion, Vice Chairman Chris Bowers stated he would like to pull back his motion made earlier. He asked Mr. Brink if this ordinance change is in line with what is happening in other areas in municipalities.
- Chris Brink stated yes.
- Councilman Carl Hudson pulled back his second on the motion as well.
  - Chairman Costner asked if there was any other discussion. Chairman Costner asked all those in favor to constitute second reading of Ordinance 562 to please signify by raising their hand. Motion carried.

Hearing no further Council business, Chairman Roy Costner called for a motion to adjourn. Motion was made by Councilman Wes Hendricks, seconded by Councilman Carl Hudson and carried unanimously. Pickens County Council stood adjourned at 8:54 p.m.
