

Regular Pickens County Council Meeting

November 6, 2017

6:30 PM

County Council met in regular session, in the Auditorium, County Administration Facility, with Chairman Roy Costner presiding. Agendas, bearing date, time, and location of meeting were mailed to Council members and local news media on October 31, 2017.

WELCOME AND CALL TO ORDER:

Chairman Roy Costner called the meeting of November 6, 2017 to order and welcomed those in attendance.

Councilman Ensley Feemster read a statement about the recent tragedy at the First Baptist Church in Sutherland Springs, Texas. Mr. Feemster commended the efforts by Sheriff Rick Clark, to offer safety and security seminars to churches in the county. Councilman Ensley Feemster further led the Invocation and Pledge of Allegiance.

COUNCIL CORRESPONDENCE:

- Chairman Roy Costner announced the Committee of the Whole will meet on Monday, November 13th at 6:00 p.m. in the main conference room of the Administration Facility.
- Chairman Roy Costner read the following statement regarding SPCA:
“As many of you have heard, our new adoption facility is now open and adopting animals to the public. The USPCA (Saving Pickens County Animals) will take dogs and cats that are owner surrendered or are seized by Pickens County Animal Enforcement. Previously the County had very limited (mainly bad) options for these animals, but thanks to County Council’s reforms of the Animal Control Ordinance this past spring, we can now offer adoptions to the public. As a part of our opening celebration, we are offering free adoptions to county employees and other qualified applicants for the first 50 animals. Twelve found new homes through our program on this past Saturday alone; and as I understand it, three more animals were adopted today.”
“The facility is located on Prison Camp Road just off of Shady Grove Road west of Pickens. Our new program is still being developed in many ways, and we welcome citizen input as we form policies and procedures for our operation, but in the meantime, we hope the public will embrace our new approach, and perhaps embrace a new family pet in the process, as we move from Animal Control to Animal Care.”

PUBLIC FORUM:

Chairman Roy Costner opened the Public Forum and requested the Clerk to call upon the citizens who signed up to speak.

1. Pree Hamilton: Ms. Hamilton appeared to provide an update on the Pickens County Humane Society, and to advise of their ongoing efforts to keep the Humane Society open. She provided a GoFundMe campaign flyer, and an example of an email campaign to drive donations, to members of council. Ms. Hamilton stated that the net proceeds of the recent golf tournament were approximately \$11,000. She also mentioned other recent fundraising efforts. Ms. Hamilton displayed the fundraiser calendars that were donated to the Humane Society, and will be sold for \$20 each. She requested that the County “keep” the Humane Society until the SPCA “gets their feet wet and everything works out”. Ms. Hamilton stated that she is glad that the Sheriff’s Office has taken over Animal Control.
2. Kim Jackson: Ms. Jackson appeared to speak about Upstate SPCA and the Humane Society. She stated that having Upstate SPCA is a great thing. Ms. Jackson stated that she understands not funding a 501c3, but many 501c3 organizations do receive government funding. She stated the efforts to create an open intake facility that offers adoptions and works with rescue groups, is a great step; however, there needs to be more done in regards to spay and neuter programs, addressing backyard breeders, addressing flea markets sales, and addressing puppy mills. Ms. Jackson stated that until all of the mentioned issues could be addressed, the County needs all rescue groups and shelters to function. She encouraged Council to fund the Humane Society, as the organization needs time to become self-sufficient and hopefully obtain grant funding.
3. Linda Albrecht: Ms. Albrecht appeared to thank Councilman Carl Hudson for his assistance with her issue regarding group homes. She clarified that she resides in a small and quiet, thirteen home neighborhood. Ms. Albrecht stated that 145 Rock Sound Rd. was an owner-occupied, three bedroom doublewide that was vacated by the owner, and left unoccupied for approximately nine months. She stated that a company purchased the home, surrounded the property with seven foot tall locked fence, and created a type of assisted living facility. Ms. Albrecht stated that there had been instances when a person, residing at this facility, would scale the fence to wander the neighborhood. She mentioned that there were loud and offensive fights, using obscene language that would be disruptive to her and her neighbors. She mentioned there had also been an issue with loud, obscene music. Ms. Albrecht stated that after her discussion with Councilman Carl Hudson, the County approached the property owner and the fights and loud music subsided. She stated that the neighborhood is still experiencing high traffic to and from this facility. She encouraged Council to adopt an ordinance to prevent these types of commercial facilities from opening in residential neighborhoods.
4. Darren Howard: Mr. Howard appeared to discuss a noise ordinance in regards to his residence at 373 Allgood Farm Rd. in Pickens. He stated that the Sheriff’s Office has been out to his residence many times regarding his complaint of excessive noise at his neighbor’s property. Mr. Howard stated that the loud music and gunshots are very disruptive, preventing him from sleeping at night.
5. Margaret Thompson: Ms. Thompson appeared to discuss the Animal Shelter. She stated that where the County is now, from where the County was six months ago is a huge improvement. Ms. Thompson recommended that the name be “Pickens County SPCA” instead of “Upstate SPCA”, as the website is difficult to locate in a web search. She stated that the intake facility is vital, because when the Sheriff’s Office brings the animals in, they go to intake and then for adoption, when they may not be medically ready for adoption. She stated that the free adoption is

a bad idea. Ms. Thompson also stated that a resident in Easley received a notice that she was going to be fined \$300 for each of the feral cats on her property.

6. Marylou Crowley: Ms. Crowley appeared to discuss the Animal Shelter. She thanked Council and Staff for opening the Shelter and mentioned that she is a former volunteer of the Shelter. She stated that her daughter was asked to foster a dog on November 2nd, and when she saw the dog, she was mortified. She stated that the dog had lost 25 percent of its body weight over the past month and had double eye infections, among other health issues. Ms. Crowley stated that the dog had been there 2 ½ months, and had deteriorated since she had been removed from her volunteer position. She stated that the animal health care at the Shelter needs to be addressed. She also stated that the volunteers were asked to leave and told that they could come back once staff training was complete, have not been contacted or notified.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

- Motion was made by Councilman Carl Hudson and seconded by Councilman Ensley Feemster to approve the October 2, 2017 council meeting and the October 4, 2017 planning retreat minutes.
 - During discussion, Councilman Trey Whitehurst stated that he would abstain from the vote, as he was not present at the planning retreat.
- Motion carried (5-1), with Councilman Trey Whitehurst abstained.

ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT:

County Administrator, Gerald Wilson, provided the following report:

Monthly Report by Department: Mr. Wilson advised that a copy of the monthly report, that outlines each department, was placed on the Council's desks. He asked the Council provide any feedback regarding the report to him.

Request to Add Item to Executive Session: Mr. Wilson requested that Council consider adding the following item to Executive Session on tonight's agenda: Contractual Item: Vineyards Fire Department.

County Office Schedule: Mr. Wilson advised that the County offices would be closing at noon on Wednesday, November, 22nd and would reopen on Monday, November 27th, in observance of Thanksgiving. He stated that he and the Pickens County Staff would like to wish Council and the members of the public a Happy Thanksgiving.

COMMITTEE REPORTS: October 25, 2017 – Committee of the Whole

PROPOSED ORDINANCE IN COW REPORT:

SECOND READING OF ORDINANCE NO. 546 TO AMEND CHAPTER 14 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCE OF PICKENS COUNTY, THE DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS ORDINANCE, TO COMPLY WITH REQUIREMENTS FROM THE SOUTH CAROLINA DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES AND THE FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY, AND OTHER MATTERS RELATED THERETO.

The Committee of the Whole met in the Main Conference Room on Wednesday, October 25, 2017 at 6:00 p.m. All members of the committee were in attendance with Chairman Roy Costner presiding.

WELCOME AND CALL TO ORDER:

Chairman Roy Costner called the Committee of the Whole meeting to order and welcomed those in attendance. Vice Chairman Chris Bowers led the Invocation and Pledge of Allegiance.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE:

Outdoor Special Events Ordinance – Log No. 72

- Chris Brink stated that discussion on the proposed ordinance began in 2013. He clarified that there have been no known issues in the past five years that the proposed ordinance would have addressed. Mr. Brink stated that his recommendation is to shelve this ordinance until issues arise in the future.
 - Councilman Trey Whitehurst stated that the previous council was told there were issues with complaints, law enforcement involvement, people getting ran off of the roadway, etc. He also stated that he thought this ordinance had provisions to collect fees to offset some of the costs incurred for referenced events.
 - Chief Deputy Creed Hashe responded that there may be complaints received for bicyclist on the roadway, but that is not necessarily a result of an organized event. He stated that state law allows two bicyclists to ride two abreast on the roadway.
 - Chris Brink stated that there were provisions for costs in the proposed ordinance.
 - After much more discussion, the Committee agreed to share their comments and concerns regarding the proposed ordinance with the Administrator. The Administrator will direct staff to incorporate any recommendations in a draft ordinance for review at a future committee meeting.
- ❖ No Action Taken by Committee

Executive Session: S.C. Code of Laws, Section 30-4-70 (a)

- Chairman Roy Costner moved to convene into Executive Session as defined by S.C. Code of Laws, Section 30-4-70 (a), to discuss an economic development matter related to Project United. Motion was seconded by Vice Chairman Chris Bowers and carried unanimously.

Economic Development - Section 30-4-70 (a) (5)

- ❖ **Project United – Log No. 75**

Public Session Reconvened:

Chairman Roy Costner called the Public Session back to order. He directed the County Administrator to proceed with due diligence efforts for Project United.

- ❖ No further action was taken on Project United

DSO Amendment - Ordinance No. 546 – Log No. 73

- Chris Brink stated that the proposed amendments to the UDSO, Article 11, Section 1105 as it pertains to flood damage prevention are mandated by the state, and required by FEMA to participate in the Flood Insurance Program. He advised that the amendments were unanimously recommended by the Planning Commission.
- Phillip Trotter advised that the current flood maps have an effective date of April 16, 2008. He stated that the effective date of the FEMA updated maps will be December 21, 2017, once three readings of the Ordinance have occurred. Mr. Trotter advised that FEMA has taken several different steps to notify and involve the community; for example in March of 2016, there was a Seneca Watershed Public Outreach held with a 90 day appeal period. He stated that there were no appeals for Pickens County at the end of that 90 day period, and FEMA has moved forward to obtain the December 21st date.
- Councilman Wes Hendricks asked if any floodplains were added in the update.
- Mr. Trotter responded that there were 10-12 properties that were affected; however, those property owners were notified and, to the best of his knowledge, there were no structures added.
- Mr. Trotter clarified that if the County does not adopt these changes, and becomes non-complaint with FEMA requirements, the County could lose the ability to offer flood insurance for citizens in Pickens County.
- After more discussion, Chairman Roy Costner moved to recommend second reading of Ordinance 546, amending the UDSO to comply with SCDNR and FEMA requirements as it pertains to flood damage prevention.

- ❖ Committee recommends second reading of Ordinance 546, amending the UDSO to comply with SCDNR and FEMA requirements as it pertains to flood damage prevention.

Council Action on Log No. 73:

- During discussion, Councilman Trey Whitehurst asked for clarification that this is separate from the building code amendments, and that the only changes are related to what has been updated in state law and required for the County to adopt.
- Ken Roper stated that is correct and further clarified that if the County does not comply with this mandate, the homeowners in the County may be impacted.

Councilman Wes Hendricks asked for clarification that nothing has been added to the version previously written.

- Mr. Roper responded that there were changes and advised that Chris Brink could speak to the specific changes.
- Vice Chairman Chris Bowers asked for clarification if the proposed document was the same document that the Committee of the Whole discussed line item by line item, with a lot of language struck and minimal language added.
- Mr. Roper responded “Regarding flood, yes”.

Councilman Wes Hendricks stated that it was important to him that the proposed language passes the “stranger test”, where anyone can understand the ordinance as written.

- Councilman Wes Hendricks moved to amend Section 1103 (e)-Earthen embankments, on page 11-3, to clearly define the acronym, AASHTO. Councilman Hendricks further moved to amend Section 1103 (e)-Earthen embankments, on page 11-4, to clearly define “90 percent of what” in the following language: “All other embankments are to be compacted to at least 90 percent.” Motion was seconded by Councilman Trey Whitehurst and carried unanimously.
- After more discussion, Councilman Carl Hudson moved to amend the motion to refer Ordinance 546 to the Committee of the Whole, after the second reading. Motion was seconded by Councilman Wes Hendricks.
- During discussion of the amendment, Councilman Trey Whitehurst asked for clarification of a time constraints.
- Mr. Roper responded that the Ordinance would need to be adopted on or before December 21, 2017. He further clarified that the Ordinance would need to have third reading by the referenced date.
- Motion to amend second reading carried unanimously.
- Motion carried unanimously to constitute second reading of Ordinance 546, as amended, and commit to the Committee of the Whole.

Building Codes – Log No. 44

- ❖ No Action Taken by Committee

Mark Wood Strings Program – Log No. 69

- Jay Pitts advised that he has engaged Mark Wood and Clemson University to determine availability for a 150 year celebration event next spring. He stated that the only available dates are April 10-13, 2018. Mr. Pitts clarified that the goal would be to create a three day experience for 900-1500 students, with a concert on the third night. He stated that there would be efforts to obtain corporate sponsors and to sell tickets for the concert to recoup some or all of the expense, with any additional funds to be given as music scholarships.

Mr. Pitts stated the approximate costs would be \$68,500 for 900 children or \$80,000 for 1,500 children; plus the two day venue cost for Littlejohn Coliseum estimated to be \$25,000 per day. Mr. Pitts mentioned that Oconee County has interest in partnering with Pickens County to collectively celebrate both 150 year anniversaries. He also shared the plan to engage the School District as well.

- Councilman Wes Hendricks recommended including special needs children in this event.
 - Chairman Roy Costner stated that he has been in contact with Clemson University and the Governor regarding the 150th celebration.
 - Councilman Trey Whitehurst asked for clarification of how this expenditure would be funded.
 - Gerald Wilson responded that the only option is from the general fund. He clarified that approximately \$400,000 from the cost savings of health insurance remains in the general fund.
- Vice Chairman Chris Bowers moved to recommend that this item be placed on the November 6 agenda. Motion was seconded by Councilman Carl Hudson and carried unanimously.
- ❖ The Committee recommended that this item be placed on the November 6 council meeting agenda.

Council Action on Log No. 69:

Chairman Roy Costner requested that the Tourism Director, Jay Pitts, provide an update on this item.

Mr. Pitts advised that the dates of April 11-13, 2018 have been confirmed for the event. He advised that the County Attorney is currently reviewing the contract for Mark Wood; the plan is to move forward with the contract by December 1st based on Council's action tonight. Mr. Pitts stated that the total budget of the event is projected to be \$150,000, with an anticipated 50 percent split with Oconee County. Mr. Pitts asked for Council to consider approving \$75,000, as Pickens County's portion of the event, to kick-off the 150th Year Celebration for Pickens and Oconee counties. He clarified that he is diligently working on a contingency plan if Littlejohn Coliseum or Oconee County backs out.

- Councilman Ensley Feemster moved to approve the Mark Wood Strings Program expenditure of not exceeding \$75,000 from the general fund for the 150th Year Celebration. Motion seconded by Councilman Wes Hendricks.
 - During discussion, Councilman Wes Hendricks stated that Mark Wood attended Pickens High School and the program was very successful. He asked Jay Pitts to elaborate on the program.
 - Mr. Pitts clarified that the Mark Wood Strings Program promotes music and arts education.
 - Mr. Pitts stated that Mark Wood was one of the original founders of the Trans-Siberian Orchestra; he has left the Orchestra to enter the classrooms to educate children on how important music is to the world. He advised that Mark Wood will visit a community for a week, where he educates young students that are interested in participating in this music experience for 3-4 days, and concludes the event with a grand concert.
- After more discussion, motion to approve the Mark Wood Strings Program expenditure of not exceeding \$75,000 from the general fund carried unanimously.

Hearing no further Committee business, Chairman Roy Costner called for a motion to adjourn. Motion was made by Vice Chairman Chris Bowers, seconded by Councilman Ensley Feemster and carried unanimously. The Committee of the Whole stood adjourned at 8:15 p.m.

MOTION PERIOD AND NEW BUSINESS:

- Vice Chairman Chris Bowers moved to add “Contractual Item: Vineyards Fire Department” to Executive Session, as requested by the County Administrator. Motion was seconded by Councilman Carl Hudson and carried unanimously.

PUBLIC HEARING AND SECOND READING OF ORDINANCE NO. 547 AUTHORIZING PICKENS COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA TO ENTER INTO AN INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT WITH CITY OF EASLEY; AMENDING THE TERMS OF THE SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE PARTIES BY AND THROUGH THE PROVISIONS OF THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT; AND OTHER MATTERS RELATED THERETO.

Chairman Roy Costner opened the public hearing for comments regarding Ordinance 547. The Chairman called on the following to speak:

- 1) Margaret Thompson: Ms. Thompson requested that the Council be cautious with TIF (tax increment financing). She also stated to make sure that the other party does what they said they were going to do.
- 2) Steve Haynie: Mr. Haynie requested that the Council does not proceed with this action.

There being no more speakers, Chairman Roy Costner declared the public hearing closed.

- Motion to constitute second reading of Ordinance 547 was made by Vice Chairman Chris Bowers and seconded by Councilman Ensley Feemster.
 - During discussion, Councilman Wes Hendricks stated concerns with the IGA related to page 2, section 3(b) as follows: “City shall solicit and receive the prior written consent of the County Administrator”. Councilman Hendricks stated that his concern is that the approval should come from County Council and not the Administrator.
 - Councilman Trey Whitehurst stated that the Administrator, at that point, would be appropriating tax dollars without the consent of County Council, as Council would need to vote on any tax spending that occurs.
- Vice Chairman Chris Bowers moved to amend page 2, section 3(b) to replace the language “written consent of the County Administrator” to ‘written consent of the County Council’. Motion was seconded by Councilman Wes Hendricks and carried unanimously.
 - During further discussion, Councilman Trey Whitehurst advised that he would not be voting in favor of this Ordinance.

Councilman Wes Hendricks asked for clarification from the County Attorney, on section 7 on page 4, relating to severability.

-Mr. Roper responded that while he did not draft this agreement, this language is commonly included in documents to preserve the intent of council, in the event an error is made when council action is taken.

Councilman Wes Hendricks asked for confirmation that this document would “hold-up” in the court of law, and that it would be enforceable.

-Mr. Roper responded yes, clarifying that wouldn’t fall under section 7, but would be enforceable through specific performance.

Councilman Wes Hendricks asked for clarification from the County Attorney, on section 9 on page 4, in regards to the taxing entities.

-Mr. Roper responded that one example would be the School District.

Councilman Wes Hendricks asked for clarification of how the project would be approved, asking if there would be a board, etc.

-Vice Chairman Chris Bowers responded that the last amendment addressed that, in that County Council had to approve the project(s).

Vice Chairman Chris Bowers stated for the record that, the City of Easley has asked the County to extend their TIF. He advised that he knew there have been issues in the past with TIFs. Vice Chairman stated that this agreement does not require 100% by the County, that there is a cap; after the cap, the County collects the remaining dollars. He clarified that the funds cannot be rolled over to the following year. Vice Chairman Bowers further clarified that if less than the cap is received, the County is not responsible to meet the cap. He reiterated that County Council has to approve the projects. He stated that this agreement is not just “an open, blank check” like it has been in the past. There are some stop-gap scenarios of protection in place, the way the Ordinance is written.

- Motion to constitute second reading of Ordinance 547, as amended, carried (5-1) with Councilman Trey Whitehurst opposed.
